ASMS Research Awards

ASMS Research Awards were presented to Assistant Professor **Michael T. Marty** (University of Arizona) and Assistant Professor **James S. Prell** (University of Oregon) at the 2018 ASMS business meeting in San Diego. The goal of these awards, presented annually in the amount of \$35,000 each and are fully supported by Thermo Fisher Scientific and Waters Corporation, is to promote academic research in mass spectrometry by young scientists in mass spectrometry.

ASMS Postdoctoral Career Development Awards

ASMS Postdoctoral Career Development Awards were presented at the 2018 ASMS business meeting in San Diego to Dr. Yanlong Zhu (University of Wisconsin-Madison), Dr. Shen Zhang (Lunenfield-Tanenbaum Research Institute, University of Toronto), Dr. Alan Jarmusch (University of California-San Diego), Dr. Martha Chacón-Patiño (National High Magnetic Field Laboratory, Florida, Florida State University) and Dr. Mac Gilliland (University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill). These awards, provided annually, are open to ASMS members who are currently appointed as a postdoctoral fellow in academia, industry, a government or national laboratory, or at a research institute in North America, within three years of completing their Ph.D. or equivalent degree. A \$10,000 gift is provided to the institution or institution-related foundation in the name of each awardee, for their exclusive use on activities that enhance the awardee's professional career development in the field of mass spectrometry.

The awards are intended to support ASMS conference travel. Conference attendance is required. Applicants must be ASMS student members who are in the 2nd year or more of a Ph.D. degree program at the time of the conference, and are the presenting author on an abstract submitted for the ASMS annual conference. Ten awards for \$1,000 each, as well as free conference registration and a matted certificate, were conferred during the 2018 ASMS business meeting.

Undergraduate Student Awards

ASMS Undergraduate Student Awards recognize undergraduate students whose academic achievements and interest in mass spectrometry research display a high level of excellence and distinction. Applicants must be enrolled full time in an undergraduate degree program or be within one month of graduation at the time of the conference, and be the presenting author on an abstract submitted for the ASMS annual conference. The Awards are intended to support ASMS conference travel. Conference attendance is required. Applicants may also participate in the conference poster competition for undergraduate students. Up to ten awards of \$500 each are conferred annually, along with free conference registration and a matted certificate.

Ron Hites Award

The 2018 Ron Hites Award for Outstanding Research Publication in JASMS was presented during the ASMS business meeting to Professor Peter B. Armentrout (Department of Chemistry, University of Utah) and co-authors John E. Carpenter, Christopher P. McNary, April Furi, and Andrew F. Sweeney, for their paper "How Hot are Your Ions Really? A Threshold Collision-Induced Dissociation Study of Substituted Benzylpyridinium 'Thermometer' Ions" (J. Am. Soc. Mass Spectrom. 2017, 28, 1876-1888). Named to honor Professor Ron Hites of Indiana University, who led the creation of JASMS in 1988 while president of ASMS, the award recognizes an outstanding presentation of original research published in the journal in the previous two years. Selection of the award winner is based on the paper's innovative aspects, technical quality, likely stimulation of future research, likely impact on future applications, and quality of presentation. The principle author receives a cash award of \$2,000 and all authors are acknowledged with certificates of commendation.
